



Strengths:

- Faculty of Agriculture & Animal Husbandry is situated in a rural and a natural ambience which is required for the academic programmes in agriculture and Location of the Faculty and the University in a multi ecological zone of Dindigul district which is a highly representative district having all types of farming systems such as wetland, garden land, dryland and high elevation farming systems.
- ➤ Diverse academic programmes in Agriculture are offered by the faculty covering various disciplines like Agriculture, Horticulture and Dairy Science at different levels starting from Diploma to Doctoral levels and all the programmes are highly demand driven.
- > Students are getting 100 per cent placement in various sectors. Graduates of this faculty are much wanted by a variety of employers like government, quasi government, non-government, corporate, industrial sectors etc.
- Faculty has multi-disciplinary staff representing almost all the disciplines of agriculture and all of them are highly qualified, well experienced, committed and updated in their knowledge.
- ➤ Faculty is receiving highest number of applications and getting highest student enrolment as compared to other departments.

Weaknesses:

- Faculty suffers from lack of adequate extent of cultivable lands for various farming systems and Water resources for crop cultivation and animal husbandry are very much limited.
- ➤ Insufficient number of staff at all levels not able to provide optimum staff student ratio and hence individual attention could not be paid to the students due to high student staff ratio
- ➤ Limited budgetary resources are only available to support academic and research programmes of the faculty and Lack of other infrastructure such as buildings, laboratory facilities, library resources, generator sets, teaching and office equipments etc.

Opportunities:


- > Trifurcation of the faculty and creation of at least three departments viz. Departments of Agriculture, Horticulture and Animal Husabndry.
- ➤ Up gradation of Ph.D. Programme in agriculture with introduction of course work as like in any other agricultural university.
- > Starting Post Graduate degree programmes in various disciplines of Agriculture and Animal Husbandry.
- > Strengthening the research activities and Development of technologies for the new thrust areas such as organic farming, traditional agriculture, bio-fuel crops, mitigation of climate change etc and Creating a repository of farm technologies and emerging as the master hub of farm information for the Dindigul district.
- > Creating Industry-Institutional linkages for all the academic programmes and research activities of the faculty so as to make them useful to the society.

Challenges:

- ➤ The Faculty and its farms are situated in a rain shadow area with no other perennial water sources and Huge infrastructure like laboratories and fields is yet to be created for the professional degree like B.Sc. (Agri.) Programme.
- > Sudden spurt in the establishment of self financing agricultural colleges in the recent years poses challenge to our degree programme which has been started very recently.
- ➤ Unable to create facilities matching with those of state agricultural university/ colleges and Obtaining approval and accreditation from the appropriate government agencies for our degree programme.
- As most of the students hail from rural areas with Tamil medium background, it is found difficult to teach and make them to understand the subjects in English medium. The students also find it difficult to develop good communication skills.
- Less scope for increasing the budgetary resources for the academic and research activities of the faculty.
